### Club Person of the Year Award

Our club would not function without the voluntary efforts of members throughout the season. This award recognises a member who has made an outstanding contribution to the success of the club during the season.

#### Ronnie Tanare Award

The award is named in honour of Ronnie Tanare who as a senior OUFC footballer made a significant contribution to the club. The award recognises a senior playing member who has made an outstanding contribution to the club during the season – either on field, off field or both.

#### **Ross Whitelaw Award**

Ross Whitelaw is a founding member of OUFC who had a strong passion for junior participation and development. The Ross Whitelaw Award recognises a junior playing member who has made an outstanding contribution to the club, beyond their role as a player, throughout the duration of the season.

## **Junior Competition Team of the Year Award**

Awarded to a OUFC junior competition team that epitomises the values of OUFC, including sportsmanship, enthusiasm and team spirit. Noting that the award is not directly related to results.

Jesse Stanford Memorial Award - for nomination by Coaches & Team Managers only

This award, in memory of Jesse Stanford an Ourimbah junior, is presented to a Junior (U12 – U18) player that:

- Puts the interests of his/her team and club first. Playing in positions or filling in for other teams just so that they have the numbers to take the field or people to fill positions.
- **Is a perfect role model of sportsmanship** plays the game tough but fair. Always the first to pick an opposition player up off the ground. Utmost respect for all his/her teammates and coaching staff.
- Has developed as a player through hard work at training and games and taking personal responsibility for his own development by asking for additional help.
